Instructional Updates

ZBTHS staff create impactful lessons for their classrooms, however, meaningful learning experiences are also being planned outside the classroom. For example the CTE department organized a presentation from a technical institute to help students see the post-secondary trade school options and careers in CTE. The presentation included information on opportunities and salaries connected to the skills they are learning which they can continue to pursue after high school.





With the ACT coming up on April 15, staff are busy preparing our students focusing on increased student awareness, participation, and performance. Activities include one-on-one coaching sessions, student goal setting using test score data, and structured classroom prep.

Operational Updates



Operations continue to run smooth at ZBTHS as the Principals, Deans and Safety Department work collaboratively to ensure a safe, efficient and effective learning environment. The ZB SIP team met this month to finalize their work on the development and implementation of a school-wide electronic device policy. The ZB Handbook Committee also met to conduct the annual review of school policies and procedures related to student conduct. Several recommendations will be offered for board consideration to be implemented in the 2025-26 school year. All required safety drills have now been conducted for the school year. Staff and students were excellent as they executed our Severe Weather Drill this past week!

Instructional Updates

The countdown to the April 15th ACT is officially underway! Teachers across all disciplines are integrating ACT-style questions into their coursework to help students practice and master essential skills. Students are also being equipped with strategies in reading, science, and math to demonstrate their proficiency on test day. Each student is setting individualized goals and reviewing them with their advisory teacher. We encourage parents to actively support their students in achieving these goals. Zion-Benton East offers various resources to help students prepare effectively and reach their ACT target scores.

On February 26, our math teachers participated in professional development focused on deepening students' understanding of mathematical concepts. Key topics discussed included the importance of regular cumulative review, the integration of ACT-style questions throughout the curriculum, and emphasizing depth of understanding over breadth of topics. Additionally, teachers explored strategies to engage students in meaningful discourse and use relevant, motivating examples. The insights gained from this session were immediately implemented in classrooms.

Celebrations

At Zion-Benton East, we believe in the power of celebrating student success. We recognize students who demonstrate exceptional achievement or growth in academics, attendance, or proficiency. These celebrations are highlighted through videos displayed during advisory periods and are also available for families to view on our website. We are proud to showcase the accomplishments of our students and remain committed to celebrating their hard work and dedication.

Operational Updates

At Zion-Benton East, we continue to prioritize student attendance and provide interventions for students with frequent absences. Our current attendance rate stands at 92.4%, with a chronic truancy rate of 11.8%. Encouragingly, our Class of 2028 (freshmen) is leading the way with an impressively low chronic truancy rate of 2.9%. It's inspiring to see our youngest students embracing the importance of regular school attendance. Great job, freshmen!

Zion-Benton East also values the feedback from all our stakeholders, which is why we are encouraging students, staff, and parents to participate in the 5Essentials Survey. This feedback is essential for our ongoing efforts to improve the school and ensure we provide an exceptional education for every student.

After collecting feedback from the Electronic Device Stakeholder Survey, the Zion-Benton East School Improvement Team and administration reviewed the results and implemented a new policy, effective for the 2025-2026 school year. The updated student handbook states, "During instructional time, students are not permitted to use cell phones. Instructional time is defined as any time designated for teaching, learning, assessment, or enrichment activities. All cell phones must be silenced and stored out of sight for the entire duration of each instructional period." In the coming weeks, Zion-Benton East will communicate with students and parents to ensure everyone understands the new policy, its importance in minimizing distractions, and the support systems in place to help implement it effectively.





Business, Bid, Finance Committee











Each year the Board of Education approves resolutions allowing interfund loan transfers between the Working Cash Fund and the Ed fund, O and M fund and Transportation fund as needed in the spring of each year.

This precautionary practice has been followed in case early taxes are delayed and a cash flow shortage occurs in June when we meet our year-end payrolls. These interfund loans, if needed, are repaid upon the receipt of our first installment of taxes.





On an annual basis, as part of Lake County's
Unified Development Ordinance,
developers are required to make
contributions to government bodies
affected by subdivision improvements.

In the event of a private agreement, the District is preparing this indemnification agreement in accordance with the County's requirements that it be executed by June of each calendar year.



Hazardous Walkway Recertification



Section 29-3 of the Illinois School Code requires school districts to annually review the conditions of hazardous walkways, and then certify to the State Superintendent of Education whether or not the hazardous conditions remain unchanged.

To our knowledge, there have not been any changes to the current hazardous walkways which would require a status change.

Therefore, it is the Administration's recommendation to re-certify to the State Superintendent of Education that all of District #126's hazardous walkways should remain in effect.





Since FY18, school fees in the District have remained largely unchanged.

Many have been eliminated and it is recommended that there be no changes to fee structyure approved for FY 25 for the FY26 year.

Title 1 School Plans



The Title 1 District Plan is developed every spring and must be approved before the next fiscal year's budget is submitted.

The plan is designed to reflect the specific needs of the schools and is aligned with the individual school plans, which are updated after gathering feedback from stakeholders.

Parent and community meetings are held in March to gather input, while staff feedback is collected throughout the year by supervisors.

After reviewing this feedback, the refreshed plans are submitted for approval by the Board in March or April, ensuring they are in place before the new fiscal year begins.





- District 126 is one of the few schools in Northern Illinois that recognizes individual alumni through jersey retirement or facility murals.
- This honor is reserved for alumni who achieve the highest level of success in their sport and pursue a professional career in athletics.
- Academic excellence
- Character and Sportsmanship
- Community or School Contributions
- Current Example: Billy McKinney's professional career spanned seven years, during which he played 476 games, averaged 8 points and 3.5 assists per game, and later became an NBA executive.
- Placement of recognition will be sport-specific (e.g., a professional softball player's mural would be near the softball field, while an Olympic swimmer's recognition would be in the natatorium).
- Gym banners for alumni athletes who found exemplary success
- Approval process: Requires Superintendent and BOE approval following a recommendation from the committee.


- Gym banners for alumni athletes who found exemplary success

THREE TIERS OF DISTRICT 126 STUDENT-ATHLETE RECOGNITION: TIER 3: ZEE-BEE ATHLETICS WALL OF ACHIEVEMENT (EXISTING)

- The committee acknowledges that District 126 already recognizes high school athletic accomplishments at a level exceeding that of surrounding districts.
 - To enhance this recognition, two key recommendations were made:
 - Reinstall past athlete photos in the South Commons as they were prior to construction.
 - Invest in an updated, user-friendly electronic kiosk to digitally display the Wall of Achievement.





THREE TIERS OF DISTRICT 126 STUDENT-ATHLETE RECOGNITION: TIER 2: ALUMNI ATHLETIC EXCELLENCE AWARD (NEW INITIATIVE)

Currently, there is no formal process for celebrating alumni athletic success beyond high school. This new initiative will formally honor alumni who continue to achieve excellence in their sport post-graduation. (College, Professional (both domestic and international, Olympics)

- Proposed Criteria (Must meet at least one of the criteria below):
 - Win or place in a National Championship (Team or Individual)
 - Academic excellence
 - Character and Sportsmanship
 - Community or School Contributions
 - Set a school, national, or international record
 - o Achieve a national ranking, All-Conference, All-American, or similar accolades at the collegiate or professional level
 - o Earn Team MVP or similar accolade
 - o Induction into a college or team Hall of Fame
 - Olympian
 - o Played professionally or was drafted
 - o All-American
- Other ideas
 - Eliminate all murals in the gym
 - o Gym banners for alumni athletes who found exemplary success
 - The Superintendent and/or Athletic Director can make a Special nomination/ recommendation for an athlete who did not play professionally but did attain high level status above and beyond in their sport Athletically, Academically and public accomplishments that impacted the community in a positive manner.
 - o That a deserving Alumni athlete be recognized with a Banner placed in the Basketball gym as a tier 1 recognition.
 - o Obtain academic excellence such as a doctorate in education
 - Return to the community to mentor youth



- Approval process: The committee and Athletic Director will oversee nominations and approvals. No BOE action required.


Special Induction Ceremony

Halftime Recognition at a Major Game

- Inductees will be honored during halftime at a significant sporting event (e.g., homecoming football or basketball game).
- Recognition elements:
 - Introduction of inductees on the field or court
 - Highlight reel displayed on the scoreboard






